

RE: Implementation of S.C. Code § 59-29-240, Civics Test

The purpose of this memo is to provide schools with information on implementing the required civics test beginning in 2016–17. The James B. Edwards Civics Education Initiative was enacted into law on June 3, 2015. Beginning with students entering the <u>ninth grade</u> in 2016–17, students are required to take the civics test that is published annually by the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services, as a component of their high school curriculum.

- Students must take the test when taking their U.S. Government course.
- Students will be asked to answer 10 of the 100 questions from the published civics test, selected by the teacher, which may be administered in oral or written format (local decision on format).
- Passing the test is not a requirement, nor is there a minimum score. However, to encourage improved civics knowledge, districts may recognize students who pass the test. Answering 6 of the 10 questions correctly currently comprises a passing grade.
- Students in a class where the test is being administered who entered the 9th grade before 2016–17 are not required to take the test.
- Each public school (including charters) must report the percentage of students required to take the test who scored at or above the passing score to the Education Oversight Committee, who will, in turn, reflect the results on school and district report cards.

#### **Frequently Asked Questions**

- <u>How does the teacher select the ten questions</u>? Students should be taught all of the content related to the published civics test. Ten questions should be selected by the government teacher in a manner that is consistent with administering a classroom-based test.
- <u>Do I have to test 100 percent of my students</u>? It is expected that all students taking the government class will take the civics test beginning with the 9th grade class of 2016. Please refer to this chart.

• How do I handle a new student who has moved in late? The civics test should be given as close to the end of the course (or even as a part of the final exam) to ensure that all students may take it.

- How is my percentage calculated? Each school report card is required to contain the percentage of students at or above the passing score (6 of 10) and the number of students assessed. All students beginning with the 9th grade class of 2016 on the government teachers' rosters should be included in the assessment (see note on IEPs below). The number of students scoring at or above the passing score (6 of 10) will be divided by the number of students eligible to be assessed. The quotient will be reported as a percentage on the school report card.
- <u>Do students with disabilities have to take the civics test</u>? All eligible students (see table above) taking the government course should take the civics test and be afforded any accommodation consistent with the student's individualized education program. This requirement does not apply to a student (in any grade) who is exempt in accordance with the student's individualized education program.

- Invite a local lawyer and have him speak on the rights guaranteed in the Constitution paying particular attention to the rights of children of the age in your school.
- Have students read and compare Preambles from other Constitutions from around the world. This site will be helpful as it contains a PDF of various preambles from around the world. ..http://www.americanbar.org/groups/public\_education/initiatives\_awards/constitution\_day.html.
- Choose one of the points in the Preamble (form a more perfect union, establish justice, etc.) and have your students use this as a prompt to write how this is a part of the government of the United States.
- Write an essay on one of our rights that stated in the Bill of Rights in the Constitution.
- Have students draw a political cartoon/editorial cartoon that illustrates one of our rights in the Bill of Rights.
- Have students go to Daryl Cagle's Professional Cartoonists Index site, <a href="http://www.cagle.com/">http://www.cagle.com/</a>, and search for a political cartoon that illustrates one of our rights. Have them copy and paste it to a MS Word Document, and then explain the cartoon and its relation to our Bill of Rights. (There is a teacher guide at his site.)
- In groups, have students create a new "right" for the 21st century (i.e. the right of equal access to the Internet) that should be included in the Bill of Rights. Hold a discussion of the pros and cons of including this new one. Have a class or school vote on the winning one to be included.
- Create a wall or bulletin board of pictures and articles of people exercising the rights guaranteed to them in the Constitution. Using magazines and newspapers, you can do this activity.
- Hold a discussion on how the Constitution is present in each of our lives on a daily basis. What rights do students use on a daily basis?
- Have students search the Constitution for sections that they feel apply to their lives, and then students will write a paragraph on how the section chosen does apply.
- Divide the class into groups and hand each group one of the amendments in the Bill of Rights. Have them prepare and present what the amendment means to citizens of the United States.
- Use the PowerPoint available from James Bryan to review the Constitution. *The PowerPoint is large, make sure that you email can receive and hold a large file.*

Governor McMaster has ordered a mandatory evacuation of five barrier islands in Beaufort County: Hilton Head, Harbor, Hunting, Fripp and Daufuskie. The evacuation order will go into effect at 10 a.m. Saturday.

The American Red Cross will operate evacuation shelters at Bluffton High School and Battery Creek High School, and those two shelters will open at 9 a.m. Sunday. If your parents or community members ask you for more information on the shelters, you can refer them to the state's main public information line at 1-866-246-0133, or to the American Red Cross at 1-800-REDCROSS. That contact information is also on the district's website.

All district schools will be closed on Monday. If the storm's projected track continues to move further west as it has throughout today, it's possible that Beaufort County may sustain lighter damage than expected and that it might be possible to resume school operations on Tuesday. That decision will be made as soon as we have enough information to ensure safe and orderly school operations.

Gov. McMaster's 2 p.m. news conference is still in progress, but he has already made two key announcements:

- ONE: He is delaying his decision about coastal evacuations because of the storm's projected westward turn. There is a 5 p.m. meeting with emergency management officials scheduled in Columbia, and the governor says that he will make his decision on evacuation after that meeting. He added that law enforcement will continued to be stationed across the Lowcountry, should he decide to order an evacuation for Saturday morning.
- TWO: He has backed off the idea of a statewide executive order to close all schools Monday and Tuesday. He now says that any school closures will be left up to individual districts.

Again, Hurricane Irma's projected track is further west than anticipated, and Beaufort County is currently at the far eastern edge of the danger zone. That being said, we're still three days out, so it's possible that the storm could make an unanticipated turn to the east that would bring it toward us.

We'll have more information for you – and for parents and employees – tonight.
