Last Thursday evening, **twenty-three Seniors** were honored for outstanding academic performance at the 2nd Annual Senior Scholars Banquet. Seniors that received this recognition were those that maintained a 3.5 grade point average, are in the top 10% of their class, and had at least an 85 average each quarter of their high school courses. The guest speaker for the night was a 2006 Salutatorian, Hannah DeZeeuw (Dee-Zaa- U) from Hilton Head Island High School,

a 2010 graduate from Vanderbilt University. Her message for the night was follow your "North Star".

Beaufort High School students captured 2nd place in State competition in the *Principles of Engineering* division. The team defeated South Carolina's best High School engineering programs including magnet schools and career tech schools from Charleston, Spartanburg, Anderson, Columbia, and Greenville as they all converged yesterday at the University of South Carolina in competition administered by *Project Lead the Way*.

The *Principles of Engineering* team members include Zach Womack, Cody Weyandt, and Jacob Hull. These future engineers designed and built a prototype pole climber that went higher and cost less than all but one team in the state.

Christian Hart, Adam Lipsitz, and Alex Weller competed in the *Introduction to Engineering* division. They also made an excellent showing as they met or exceeded all the competition requirements with an outstanding presentation to the judges as the endured a grueling day of a reverse engineering project.

Students at **Broad River Elementary School** recently participated in Jump Rope for Heart. During the month of February, which is American Heart Month, all students learned the importance of their heart and how to take care of it; they learned a variety of ways to jump rope; and they learned how they could be "Heart Heroes" and make a difference in someone's life by collecting money for the American Heart Association. 101 "Heart Heroes" collected \$3,275.59 in the fight against heart defects and disease. 15 classes met or exceeded their class goal of \$75 with Mr. Gallagher's 4th grade class raising the most money by collecting \$379.89. Robots from Hilton Head Island High School and Battery Creek High School are in Charleston waiting for the *First* Robotics 2011 Palmetto Regional Competition to be held March 24-26 at the Charleston Coliseum. Our students have spent months designing, building, and testing their robots. We wish each team the very best as they compete against teams from all over the southeast. Our student leaders from the Student Advisory Council will cheer our teams on next Friday.

Battery Creek High School's Marine Junior ROTC Unit is the winner of the District's First Superintendent's Cup Competition. Over 650 students from each of our high schools' ROTC units participated in the March 4th event at Battery Creek High School. Competitions included: There were five events in close order drill:

- 1. Color Guard
- 2. Armed Platoon
- 3. Armed Squad
- 4. Unarmed Platoon
- 5. Unarmed Squad

There were two physical fitness events:

1. 1-mile run (4-cadet team)

- 2. Physical Fitness Test (4-cadet team) consisting of:
 - a. Pullups
 - b. Situps
 - c. Pushups
 - d. ¼ mile sprint

One academic event: 1. A 50-question multiple choice test on Red Cross First Aid. Each school had a team of 3 cadets who took the test.

Three field events:

- 1. Dizzy Izzy (4-cadet team). This is a relay race where the first runner sprints 50 feet, spins around 10 times with their forehead on a pole, and then attempts to sprint back to the next team member.
- 2. Wooden skis (4 cadet team). Each team has a set of 8' long 4x4 boards with ropes. The team members must advance the skis while all four cadets are standing on them, using the ropes to lift the board and pull it forward.
- 3. 4-way tug of war rope (6-cadet teams). All four schools pulled at the same time using a rope that had 4 ends (2 ropes crossed in the center).

Each one of the 11 events was scored with 4 points for first place, 3 for second, 2 for third, and 1 point for fourth place. The total of points was then added to determine the overall winner. (Photos)

Special Olympics South Carolina is partnering with the Professional Tennis Registry for the 11th Special Olympics National Tennis Championship. Joining SOSC will be North Carolina, Florida, Georgia, Massachusetts, Colorado, Illinois, Maryland, Texas and Arizona. Athletes will compete in skills, short court, singles, doubles and unified doubles.

Chairman's Report

Chairman Washington read a response from an allegation regarding unsafe public schools: "Normally, the District does not respond to unfounded allegations. In this instance, however, the claim that students were permitted to attend classes on BCSD property while in ankle cuffs and/or while under arrest for murder must be addressed. This has never occurred. The young man mentioned by an earlier posting was not even enrolled in our system at the time of his arrest, and no student has ever been allowed to come to school while wearing ankle bracelets due to incarceration. This attempt to stir up fear among the Beaufort community is, in the District's opinion, uncalled for. Additionally, other unsupported accusations such as students being routinely permitted to leave school to go to Starbucks will hopefully be viewed by thoughtful readers as outlandish."

Board Member Ronald Speaks asked Chief Operational Services Officer, Phyllis White to come and speak to the public about the use of school facilities (school walking tracks specifically) during school hours. Phyllis White explained the use of school facilities (school walking tracks specifically) is shared and welcome with the community. However during school hours those facilities are not to be used by the community, they are for students. An additional reason is that maintenance applies chemicals to the track to keep it operational and students use them for physical education classes during school hours.
